






#### In 2021, close to one in four people (23.0% or 8.3 million) in Canada are immigrants


#### The highest proportion among G7 countries















### Immigrants represent almost 20% of Manitoba's population








Among the multiple pathways for coming to Canada, over two-thirds (70.5%) of the more than 58,000 recent immigrants living in Manitoba were admitted under the economic category, either as the principal applicant or the dependant.








More than one-quarter of recent immigrants residing in Manitoba have pre-admission experience.




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The Atlantic provinces

Manitoba saw its highest share of recent immigrants (5.2%) in 2016





Distribution (%) of recent immigrants by region of birth, Manitoba, 1971 to 2021





#### Most frequently reported ethnic and cultural origins by provinces and territories







































#### The share of the population with a Christian religion has been decreasing for 20 years, while the shares for other religions or no religious affiliation have been rising






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# While small, the shares of the population reporting a Muslim, Hindu and Sikh religion in Manitoba have doubled in 20 years










### One in five people (22.2%) in Manitoba is part of a racialized group

This category includes people who provided written responses such as "Guyanese," "Pacific Islander," "Polynesian," "Tibetan" or "West Indian". #### **Regional Highlights**

- Canada's urban centres are home to the vast majority (95.3%) of the racialized population.
- The portrait of racialized groups varies across regions.
- The Filipino, South Asian and Black groups are the largest racialized groups in Manitoba.
- In Manitoba, just under two thirds of the racialized population (88.8%) live in Winnipeg (CMA), 3.7% in Brandon and 1.0% in Steinbach.
